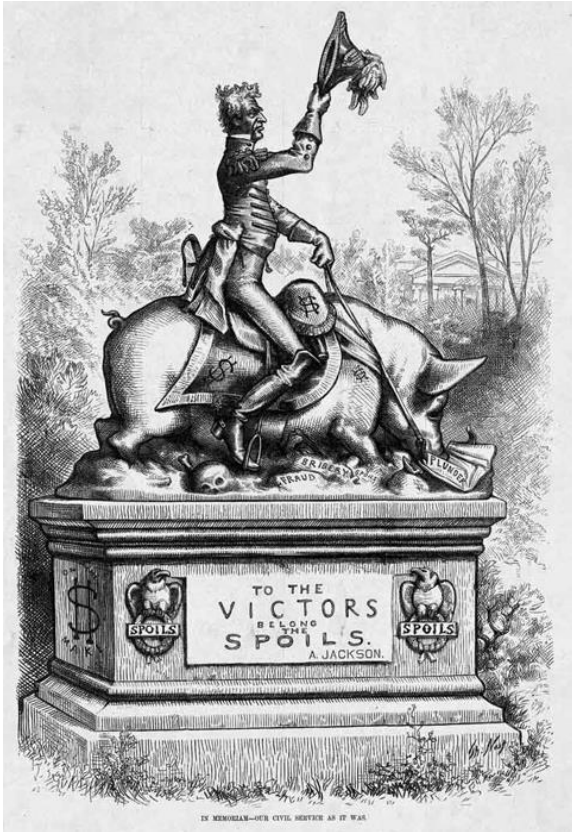

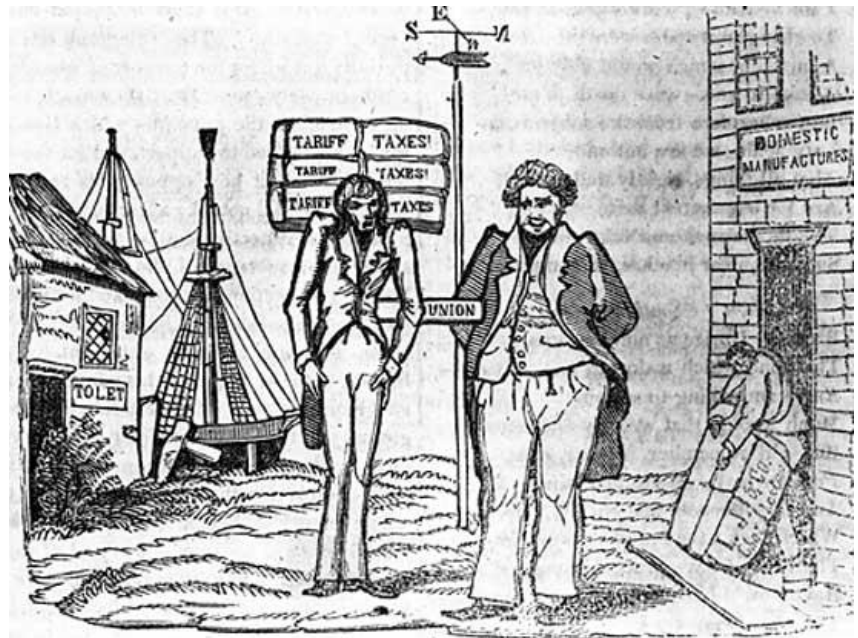
CARTOON 1 - THE SPOILS SYSTEM

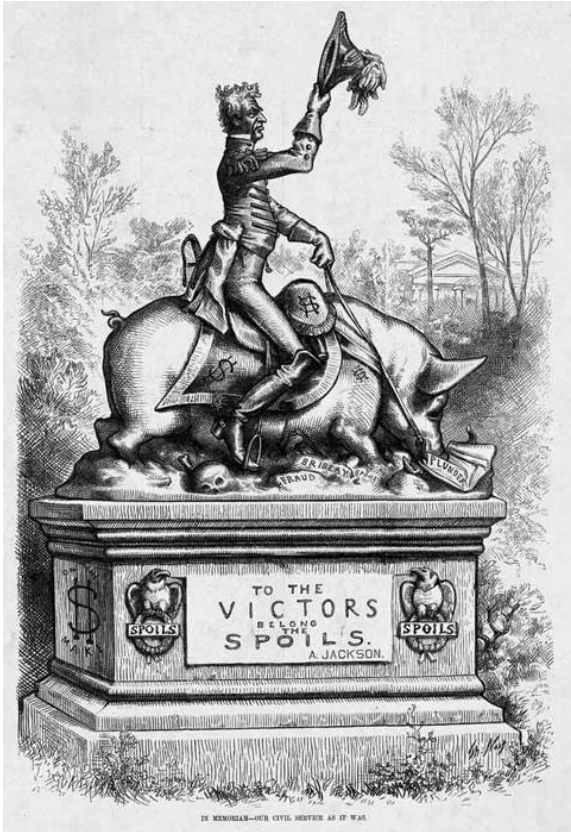

CARTOON 1 - THE SPOILS SYSTEM



1. Who did Jackson put into office when he became president?

When Jackson took office, he gave federal jobs to his party supporters, friends, and those who helped him get elected.

2. Does the artist agree with the spoils system? Explain.

The artist most likely disagrees with the Spoils System because of the dollar sign on the statue and the pig that Jackson is riding.

3. Why do you think he's riding a pig? What do the dollar signs suggest?

The pig most likely represents the gluttony of Jackson taking the jobs of others and giving them to his own supporters. Likewise, the dollar signs show the greed of taking money and jobs for his friends.

The South

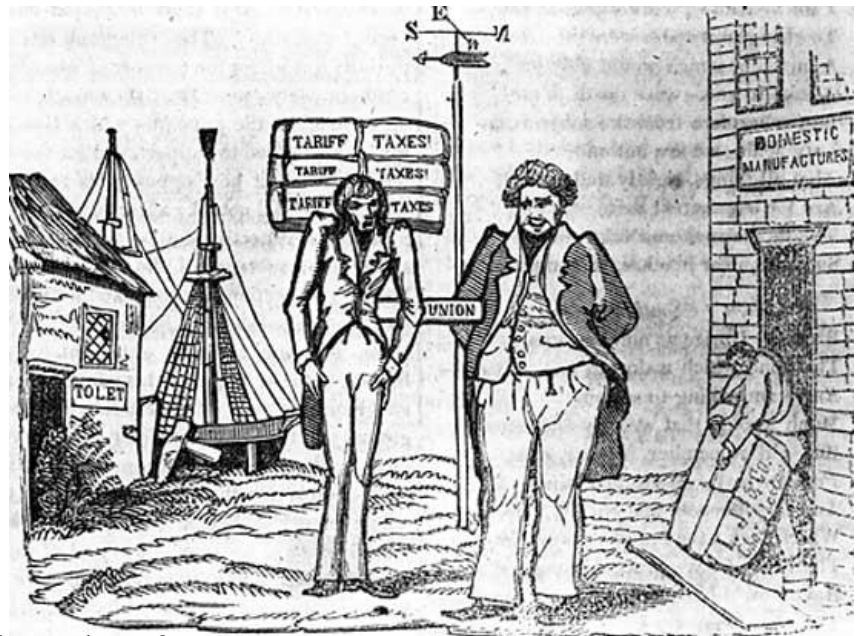
2. Who does the figure on the right of the image represent?

The cartoonist is on Jackson's side. Bankers are shown carrying money bags and one is the Devil with horns. A man behind Jackson is congratulating him and doffing his cap.

CARTOON 4 - INDIAN REMOVAL ACT

1. What was the Indian Removal Act?

The law that forced the 5 Civilized tribes from Georgia and the Southeast and forced them to reservations in the west.

2. What event is being pictured in the image to the right?

The Trail of Tears was the forced march west made by American Indians.

3. In *Worster v. Georgia*, whose side did the Supreme Court take, Jackson or the Cherokee? – **The Court sided with the Cherokee. Jackson reportedly responded: "John Marshall has made his decision; now let him enforce it!"**



CARTOON 5 - ANDREW JACKSON & VETO POWER

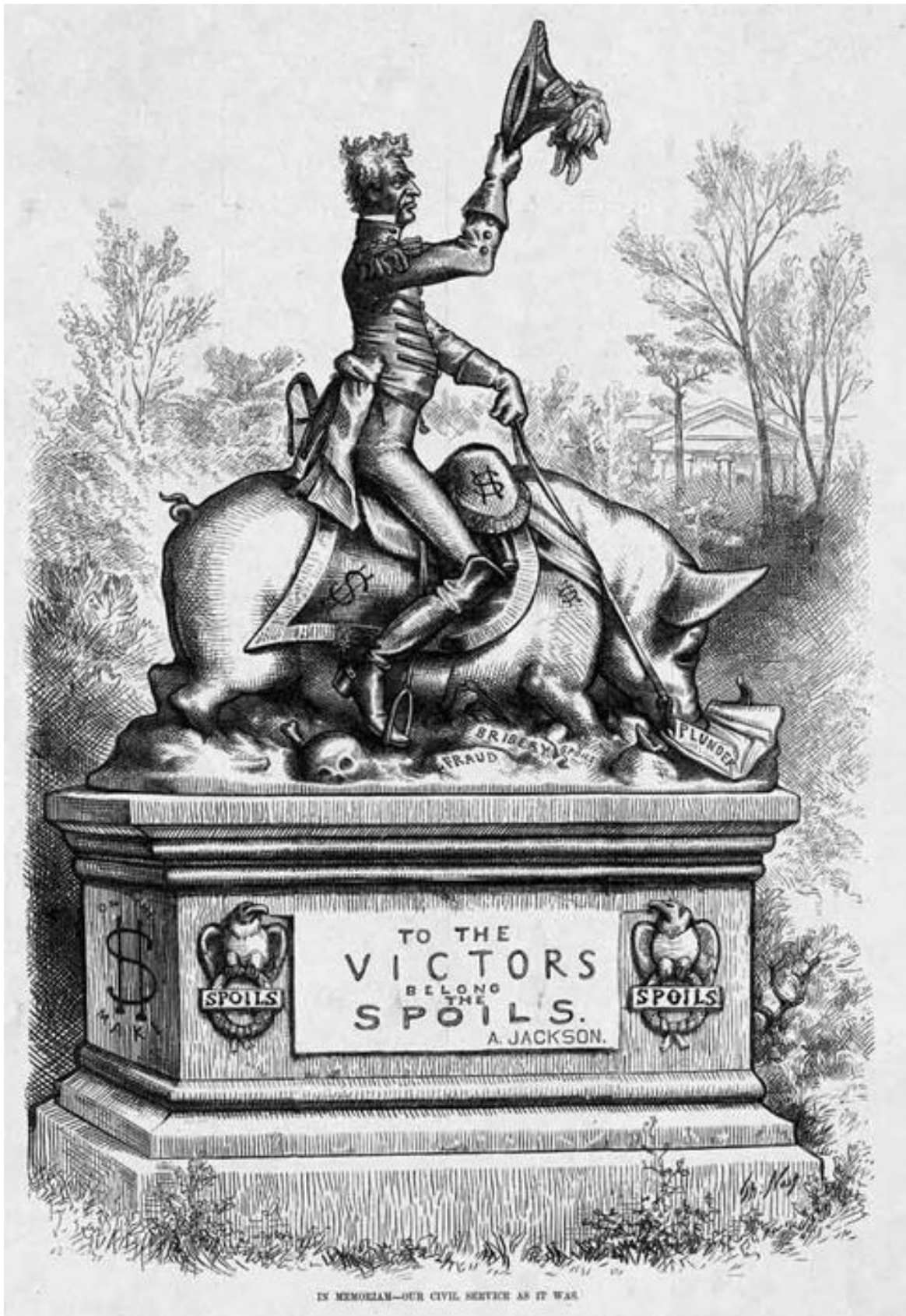
1. How is Jackson being depicted in the image to the left?

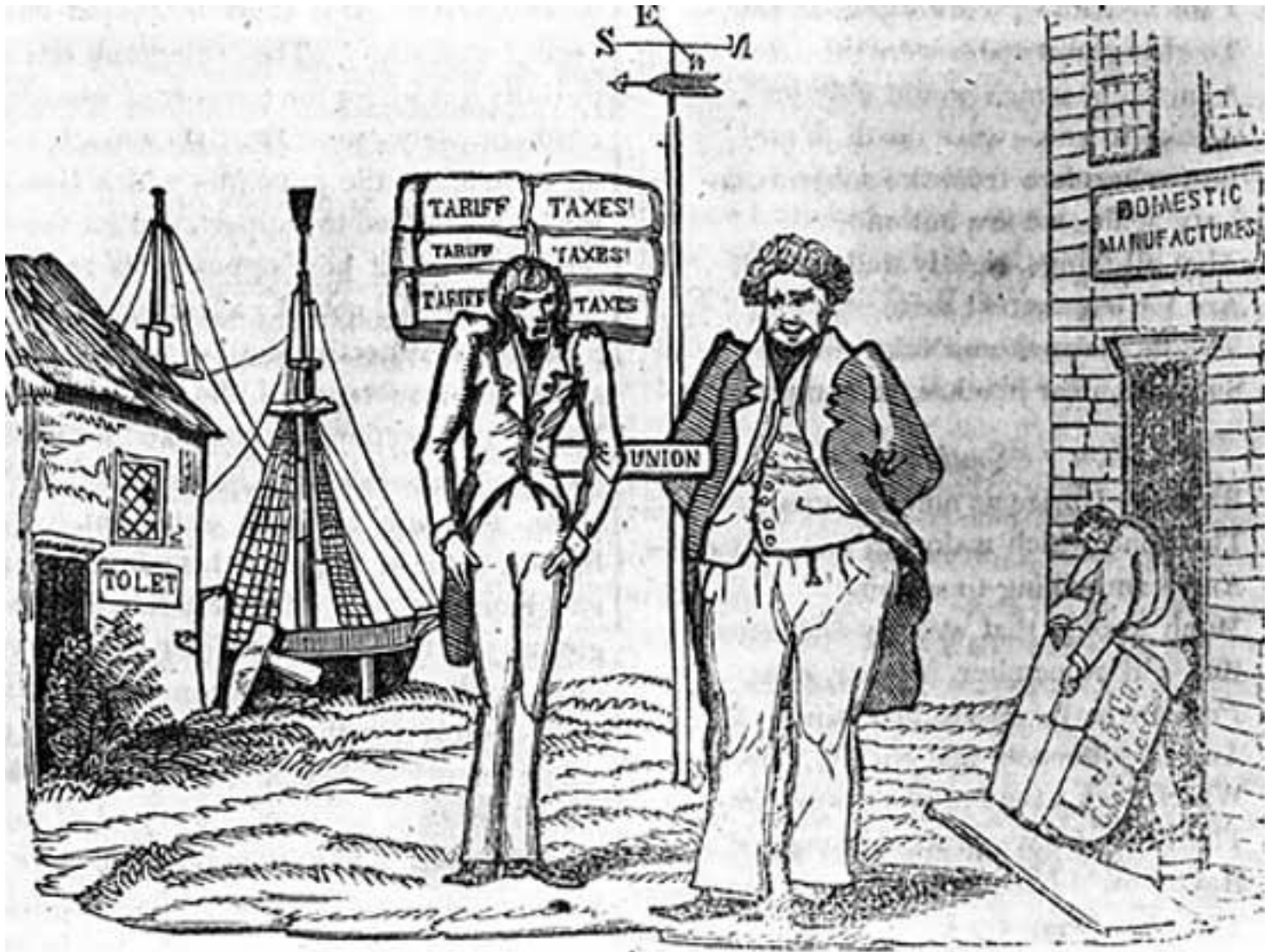
He is shown dressed up as a king, holding a document that says veto.

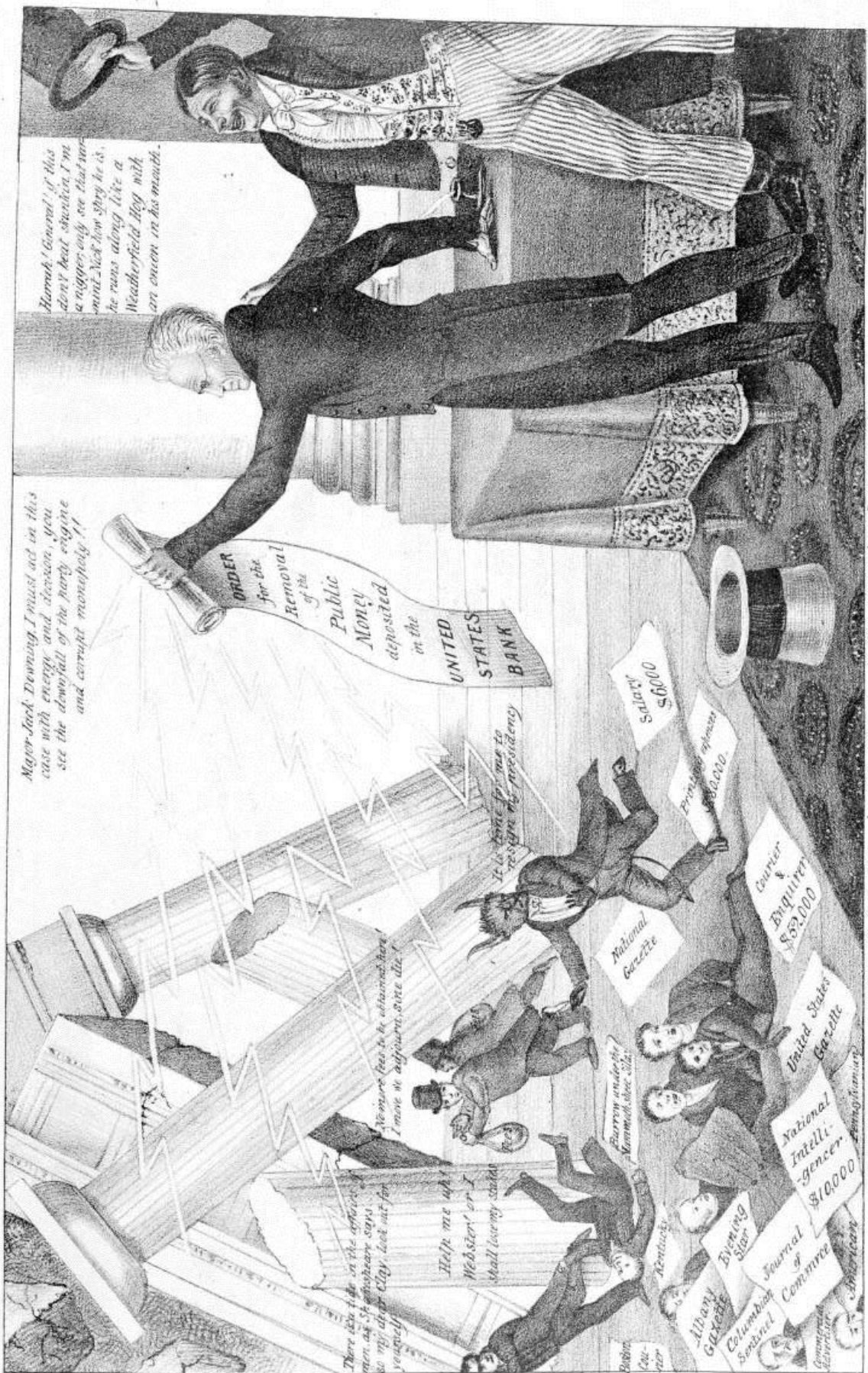
2. What is the artist's opinion of Jackson?
